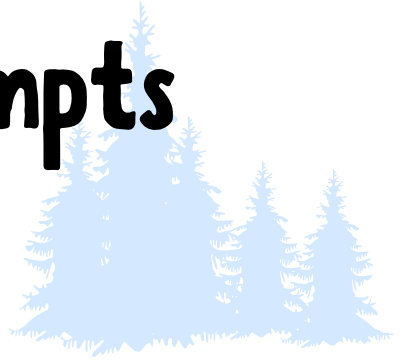


Winter Writing Prompts



1. Winter Scientist for a Day

Imagine you are a scientist studying winter.

What are you studying (snow, ice, animals, weather, or the night sky)?

Describe what you observe and write one question you want to explore.

Optional Extensions:

Use one science word (observe, experiment, temperature).

Older writers: Write one hypothesis.



2. A Snowflake's Story

Pretend you are a snowflake falling from the sky.

Describe your shape, your journey, and where you land.

Optional Extensions:

Describe your snowflake using shapes or symmetry.

Older writers: Explain why snowflakes are not all the same.

3. How Animals Survive Winter

Choose a winter animal.

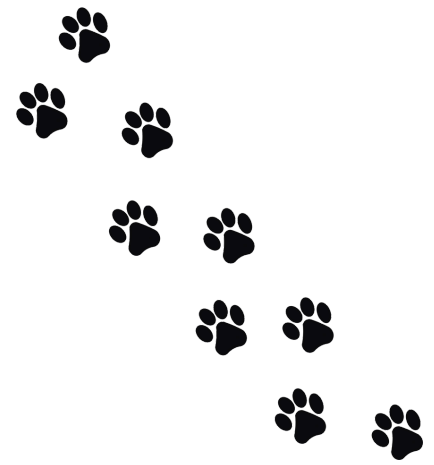
Explain how it survives cold weather.

Include food, shelter, or special adaptations.

Optional Extensions:

Use one vocabulary word (adaptation, habitat, hibernation).

Older writers: Compare winter survival to summer survival.



4. My Winter Invention

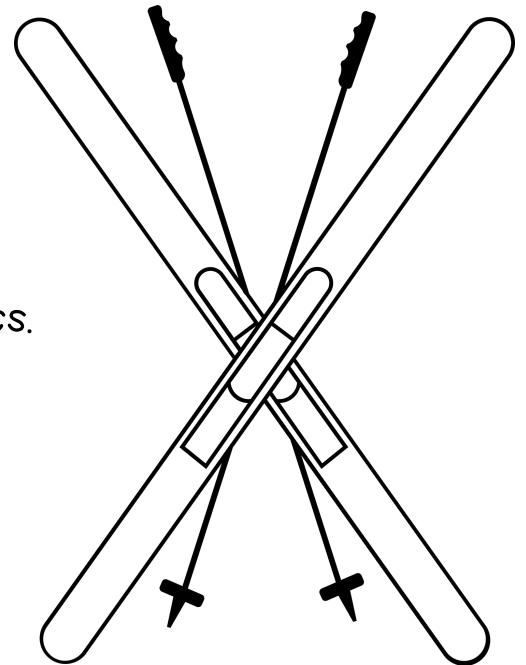
Invent something that helps people or animals during winter.

Describe what it does, how it works, and why it is useful.

Optional Extensions:

Explain the problem your invention solves.

Older writers: List materials needed to build it.



5. A Day at the Winter Olympics

Imagine you are competing in the Winter Olympics.

Which sport do you choose and why?

Describe your training and the event.

Optional Extensions:

Include a number (points, time, medals).

Older writers: Explain how science helps athletes perform.

6. Winter Night Sky Journal

Look at the winter night sky or pictures of it.

Describe what you notice about the moon, stars, or constellations.

How is the night sky different from daytime?

Optional Extensions:

Explain why stars are easier to see at night.

Older writers: Add one fact about a winter constellation.

Teacher / Parent Note

Younger students may draw or dictate their ideas.

Older students can add facts, labels, or an extra paragraph.
